- 1. Short presentations of the countries' political, economical and social problems -16th century)
- 2. We mention: Why the idea of the new religion appeared in Europe?
- 3. Showing the maps: the religious division of Europe
- 4. The students have a short discussion about the protestant ideas, e.x.
- Sinful thoughts (sex) has a bad influence on your character and hard work is good for you,
- The orders of the authorities must be obeyed,
- 5. One example of the religious persecution: (St. Bartholomew Night) show a picture
- 6. How did the religious division influenced other spheres of life e.x.: paintings, architecture: we show them two pictures on one slide and they must try to tell the difference.
- 7. Historical facts and processes which introduced the idea of religious freedom in Europe:
 - the philosophy of humanism (we introduce some ideas of humanism: e.x the man is in the centre, we give the most important names for this idea: Eras de Rotterdam)
 - the invention of printing which helped to spread the philosophy of humanism
 - the appearance of the first Encyclopedia
 - the ideas of Voltaire (we give short text of Voltaire they must find the main idea criticism)
 - the idea of Enlightenment appeared -main results the secularity of life
- 8. The religious problems in Europe now: the religious society vs. secular society: (brain storm idea: student introduce the problems e.x. abortion, euthanasia, sex before marriage etc.) –
- 9. We emphasize the idea of religious tolerance we show an article about the European Constitution that refers to the religious freedom+ Our national constitutions.

- 3. Find a picture of the Night of St Bartholomew
